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At YBCA, we believe in the transformative power of art—and the 2023-2024 year showcased how multidisciplinary arts programming can spark dialogue, inspire communities, and move people.

We began the year celebrating our signature triennial exhibition, **Bay Area Now 9 (BAN9)**, a survey of the Bay Area's most dynamic and provocative artists. As part of the exhibition, we hosted an extraordinarily wide range of supporting public programming: from poetry lunches to weaving workshops to podcasts about cult films to sketching sessions in our galleries.

Following *BAN9*, *Nick Dong: 11 to 88* captivated thousands of visitors with a unique multisensory journey that was designed to calm, heal, and enlighten. We were also proud to continue our longstanding partnerships with some of the region's most esteemed dance institutions, including Alonzo King LINES Ballet, ODC/Dance, and Smuin Contemporary Ballet.

Our values—belonging, inclusive collaboration, optimism and curiosity—are the foundation of everything we do: from the exhibitions we present, to the educational programs we lead, to the community gatherings we host. Together, they ensure that YBCA is a space for belonging and inspiration for communities across the region.

Each of our programs reflected a unique aspect of YBCA's mission—to be a gathering space for creative expression that fosters meaningful connection for all. From immersive art experiences to community-driven workshops, we look back on the highlights of the year.

Visual Arts

The visual arts were at the heart of our programming this year. **Bay Area Now 9** brought together a remarkable array of local artists whose works reflected the creativity and cultural richness of our region. **Nick Dong: 11 to 88** transformed our galleries into an immersive exploration of light, sound, and spirituality, drawing thousands of visitors.

Performing Arts

Through music, dance, and theater, we fostered connections and amplified voices, making the performing arts an integral part of our year's offerings. A full list of performances will be highlighted in the detailed section of this report.

Together, these efforts exemplify YBCA's role as a cultural anchor, where art is not just experienced but truly lived. As we reflect on the year, we are energized to continue building programs that inspire, engage, and create lasting change for the communities we serve.

Education

Education is a cornerstone of YBCA's mission. This year, we launched our free weekly art workshops, offering hands-on creative experiences that encouraged exploration and self-expression. Our ongoing partnership with Bessie Carmichael School continued to enrich the lives of students through tailored arts education programs.

Artist and Community Investment

Through the California Arts Council's Creative Corps program, we awarded grants to artists whose work addresses critical social issues, particularly within underserved communities. These investments reflect YBCA's belief in the power of artists to lead change, which resonates far beyond the walls of our institution.

A Year of Artistic Excellence

Exhibitions

Taravat (طراوت) (May 13–July 23, 2023) - This exhibition by Iranian-American artist Taravat Talepasand explored themes of women's freedoms and Muslim identity, transforming complex cultural legacies into beautiful and provocative works.

Bay Area Now 9 (October 6, 2023–May 5, 2024) - The ninth iteration of YBCA's signature triennial exhibition highlighted 30 artists working across the Bay Area's nine counties, offering a snapshot of contemporary artistic practices in the region.

Nick Dong: 11 to 88 (June 6–August 25, 2024) - An immersive exhibition by artist Nick Dong created a distinctive world of illuminated objects and mirrored rooms that provoke contemplation.



Public Art: Transforming Spaces, Engaging Communities

YBCA's public art initiatives during the 2023-2024 period have enriched our campus and the surrounding areas. Here are some notable installations:

Hyakki Yagho, Night Parade of One Hundred Demons – One Million Years of Journey with Ruby Red Fox and Their Company, Masako Miki (2023–Ongoing): Inspired by Japanese folklore, this installation on YBCA's exterior lobby windows invites passersby to engage with the enigmatic world of the Night Parade.

Ceasefire Now!, Jeffrey Cheung (2024–Ongoing): Located on YBCA's exterior Forum wall, this vibrant mural inspires peace, unity, and communal solidarity.

We Fly for a Liberated We, We Rooted in Flight, Lukaza Branfman-Verissimo (2024–Ongoing): This public artwork on YBCA's Third Street exterior emphasizes themes of freedom and community empowerment.

VISUAL ARTS

Public Programs

With our visual arts exhibitions in 2023 to 2024, YBCA hosted a wide range of public programs—including over 11 film screenings, dozens of workshops, 3 artist panel discussions, and even a weekly sip-and-sketch in our galleries.

Film Screenings (October 2023—February 2024): As part of *Bay Area Now 9*, we presented nearly a dozen dazzling and dynamic film programs—featuring everything from historic California newsreels, to a survey of Canyon Cinema's experimental films, to Leah Rosenberg's playful meditations on color found in everyday life.


Artist Workshops (October 2023—February 2024): *BAN9* artist workshops included *Community Weaving with Charlene Tan*, where participants co-created an immersive woven structure that celebrated the visual language of Filipino textile, and *Papermaking Workshop with Trina Michelle Robinson*, where visitors learned how to create their own personalized sheets of paper from recycled pulp.

Photo courtesy of YBCA. **Movement Workshops** (October 2023—March 2024): In addition to our free weekly yoga classes in the galleries, sessions like *Body Percussion for Every Body* and *Cueca Dance Class* offered visitors high-energy ways to explore rhythm, dance, and culture.

Panel Discussions & Tours (October 2023—May 2024): Hosted panels and talks included artist Heesoo Kwon's exploration of traditional Korean games and Christine Tien Wang's discussion on the financial precarity of life as a contemporary artist. Public gallery tours included an Accessibility Tour of *Bay Area Now 9*, as well as free monthly curator tours.

Performances

Joe Goode Performance Group's *As We Go* (August 2–13, 2023): A powerful blend of dance and theater exploring human connection and resilience, leaving audiences moved and inspired.

Lamplighters Music Theater's *IL DUCATO / The New Mikado* (August 12-27, 2023): A clever reimagining of Gilbert & Sullivan's *The Mikado*, this satirical production used humor and wit to explore themes of politics and society.

Diaspora Arts Connection's *Let Her Sing 2023: A Celebration of Female Voices* (September 23, 2023): A powerful concert featuring female vocalists from across the globe, celebrating the resilience, artistry, and voices of women.

American-Orient Performance Art's *Eva Tam's* 40th Anniversary in the Arts of China (September 29 - October 1, 2023): A tribute to Eva Tam's four decades of dedication to preserving and promoting the arts of China, showcasing traditional Chinese music, dance, and performance.

Parangal's *Paglinang* (October 7, 2023): A vibrant 15th anniversary performance and celebration of Filipino cultural heritage through dance, music, and storytelling.

Alonzo King LINES Ballet's Fall Season (October 12-15, 2023): An encore presentation of Alonzo King's mesmerizing choreography, exploring the intersection of tradition and innovation.

ODC/Dance's *The Velveteen Rabbit* (December 2-10, 2023): A beloved holiday tradition, this heartwarming adaptation of *The Velveteen Rabbit* combined dance, music, and storytelling to delight audiences of all ages.

Smuin Contemporary Ballet *The Christmas Ballet* (December 14-24, 2023): A festive and heartwarming holiday tradition, blending classical and contemporary dance.

San Francisco Pride Band's *Dance-Along Nutcracker: The Nutmare Before Christmas* (December 16-17, 2023): A festive and whimsical twist on the holiday classic, this interactive performance invited audiences to join the fun, blending music, dance, and celebration. Lamplighters Music Theater's *Ruddygore* 24 (February 24-25, 2024): A comedic twist on the classic Gilbert & Sullivan operetta, this production featured clever lyrics, engaging storytelling, and unforgettable music, delighting audiences with its humor and charm.



Smuin Contemporary Ballet *Dance Series* **2** (May 3-12, 2024): A dynamic showcase of contemporary ballet, pushing the boundaries of traditional dance forms.

Education and Outreach

Creative Exploration for Everyone: Weekly Art Workshops

Our *pARTicipate* workshops offered hands-on in-person experiences that encouraged participants to explore their creative sides. Designed for learners of all skill levels, these workshops created safe and inclusive spaces where individuals could express themselves, build confidence, and discover the joy of making art.

A Partnership That Transforms Lives: Bessie Carmichael School Collaboration

Through our ongoing collaboration with Bessie Carmichael School, YBCA enriched the lives of over **250 students** this year. We delivered **30 in-class and after-school interactive workshops**, led by a team of talented teaching artists who shared their expertise in visual arts, dance, and storytelling. Students worked on projects that reflected their personal stories and cultural heritage, building confidence and connection within their school community.

This collaboration was made possible by the collective effort of YBCA's dedicated six teaching artists and three teaching assistants and partnerships with community organizations, including **Bindlestiff Studio** and **United Playaz**.

Creative Corps Initiative: Empowering Art for Social Change In 2024, YBCA proudly administered the California Arts Council's **Creative Corps Initiative**, awarding grants to **48 visionary artists and cultural practitioners** across the Bay Area. These artists tackled pressing issues like housing insecurity, climate justice, and racial equity, using their creativity to inspire action and connect communities.

From murals that celebrated resilience to workshops that fostered belonging, these projects exemplified how art can address societal challenges and empower individuals to imagine a better future.






2023-24 Financials
